2017 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Friends of St. Regis Mountain Fire Tower continue to receive a continuous stream of donations from supporters. Every dollar goes towards furthering our mission. Thank you all for the support.

2017 OPERATING HIGHLIGHTS

With no major restoration work done this year, our focus was on interpretation. Our continued collaboration with the Adirondack Watershed Institute of Paul Smith's College saw tower stewards educating the public a total of eight days throughout the summer. Volunteer stewards covered an additional three days.

LOOKING AHEAD

2018 will be an exciting year for the Friends of St. Regis Mountain Fire Tower! We are actively pursuing different avenues that will allow us to have a stronger stewardship presence on the summit. Our volunteer steward calendar will be available again for those inclined to spend a day or two as an interpreter.

In the restoration department, hopeful projects that will be completed in the upcoming year include: replacement of all 24-diagonal angle steel structural members and painting. We also hope to install panoramic interpretive panels above the cab windows.

2018 is an important year because it marks the Centennial for the tower. While there had been an observation station on St. Regis earlier, the steel tower was constructed in 1918. Plans to celebrate the fire tower's 100th birthday are in the works. Stay tuned for more details! We don't want to give away all the surprises yet, but we will say this: you won't want to miss the party!



STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Stewardship Report

2017 was a tremendous year for stewardship on St. Regis Mountain. In partnership with the Adirondack Watershed Institute (AWI), the Friends of St. Regis Mountain Fire Tower were able to provide eleven days of coverage, eight days with AWI staff and three with volunteers. AWI stewards provided coverage on one or both weekend day(s) throughout all of July, and also on a few days in May, June, and August. Volunteer summit stewards provided an additional three days of coverage. Altogether, the summit stewards reached over 680 visitors.

Summit stewarding is an important way to educate visitors about history, the environment, and the importance of conservation. Throughout the summer, the stewards interacted with hundreds of visitors and helped spread the word about conservation and preservation in the Adirondacks. Since the fire tower is no longer used as a tool in the forest fire prevention efforts, it is now a platform for out-of-doors education. The tower itself served as a museum and the stewards offered information regarding how the tower and observers played a part in the protection of the natural resources of the Adirondacks.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT



A large part of the stewardship program success in 2017 was due to the new stewardship page on the FOSRMFT website. This tool allows volunteers to see a calendar with days available for stewardship. Once a volunteer picks a day, it is either then approved or denied by a FOSRMFT Board Member. After a day has been made official, Education Chair Janelle then contacts the volunteer to provide them with any information they may need to be a successful summit steward. This includes sharing

a summit steward guide book, created largely by Board Member Bob Marrone, with the help of volunteers, which has information on the tower, its history, and the surrounding landscape. In 2017, stewards reached **over 480 more** visitors than in 2016. This could not have been accomplished without the assistance of the AWI and volunteers.

In 2017, summit stewards continued to hand out summit cards, which are signed and dated by the stewards and allow hikers to keep an official record of their climb. The cards are especially popular with younger hikers, who are thrilled to be able to return with the certification.

To aid in summit stewardship, progress continues to be made on fabricating and installing interpretive panels inside the tower cab. This project is being done with the assistance of Mark Kurtz Photography, who is producing the pictures. Once this project is complete, the surrounding mountains, lakes, and other landmarks will be labeled on panels hung above the cab windows.

Here are some excerpts from the steward's summer reports:

I was the first to sign in, and the first on the top, at 9:08am, on a typical hazy August morning, with a forecast of a chance of thunderstorms after 3pm. I had 48 visitors, and three dogs. When I had no

visitors I either read a book, or wandered the rocky parts of the summit, surveying my kingdom. Most of the visitors were happy to hear a little about the history of the tower, and how it has been saved and reopened. Some older hikers could remember going up the tower when it was still active, and talking to the observer.

OUTREACH

Outreach

2017 was an excellent year for outreach for FOSRMFT. From different events to social media, FOSRMFT continues to find ways to reach a wider audience. Below is a summary:

EVENTS

Two events open the public were hosted by FOSRMFT this year.

- July 10, 2017, Friends Meeting
 - This meeting was held at Historic Saranac Lake in Saranac Lake, NY on Monday, July 10th at 7pm. Using PowerPoint, the Board Members of FOSRMFT gave an informational presentation about the history of the fire tower, the restoration process, stewardship, publicity, operations, and volunteer opportunities.
- July 23, 2017, Adirondack Fire Towers History and Restoration
 - This presentation given by fire tower author and historian Marty Podskoch was held at the Paul Smith's College Visitor Interpretive Center in Paul Smiths, NY on Sunday, July 23rd at 2pm. Podskoch spoke on the history of Adirondack fire towers and their restoration.

NEWS ARTICLES

FOSRMFT and the tower restoration were featured in two news articles in 2017. The first was in March and was published in the Adirondack Explorer and Adirondack Almanack. FOSRMFT Co-Chair Doug Fitzgerald, along with reporter Mike Lynch, hiked (and skied) to the tower via the Lake Trail, or Teddy Roosevelt Trail. The article featured a detailed description of the snowy route as well as information about the tower restoration.

In July 2017, following FOSRMFT's open house meeting, the Adirondack Daily Enterprise published an article covering the topics of the meeting, for those who could not attend.
